RIDING TIP - Excessive Tire Wear Submitted by Patrick Frampton

Excessive tire wear and/or cupping, is a problem that most motorcyclists experience over time. Too often this is simply the result of failing to maintain proper tire pressure. However this is far from a complete answer.

Cupping is a phenomena that is absolutely normal! Excessive cupping or excessive wear on one side of the tire as compared to the other is not. There are at least seven causes of cupping and/or uneven wear in the front tire other than tire pressure:

• Most roads are banked away from the center. Thus, if you ride vertically, the side of your tire closest to the center of the road wears more.



- Your tire's "scuff" when you force a speed change with them. The rear tire scuffs when you accelerate and when you brake (and every time you ride in a direction other than straight). Thus, it tends to have even cupping as compared to the front tire (which scuffs when you brake but not when you accelerate.)
- While alignment isn't usually a problem with motorcycles, it can be.
- Carrying an unevenly divided load (all your tools, jumper cables, etc.) in one saddlebag can result in your riding the bike other than vertical most of the time.







Association for Injured Motorcyclists

History of A.I.M. Vancouver

A.I.M.

From one of the founding Fathers, Ed Bell;

The idea of an association to help injured motorcyclists stared around Al Walker's kitchen table one night in 1983. Al, Ray Leadbetter, skip Stuart and myself discussed some of the pitfalls we had experienced in the recovery process after our accidents. None of us had known how to find a good lawyer experienced in handling motorcycle claims, and our support came from family and friends who had family here.

We formed a volunteer society under the British Columbia Societies Act and created a network of member/riders who would let us know of any downed riders in need of assistance. Initial funding came from dances and other social events, and from various supporters.

We started hospital visits, formed a network of legal and rehabilitative professionals, and helped where we could. Long time motorcyclist Terry Rea was instrumental in promoting A.I.M., to the motorcycle community and dealers. We are all very proud after 26 years A.I.M. is still going strong with additional chapters. It is a testament to the success of our mission statement.

The Association for Injured Motorcyclists is a Registered Non Profit Society created in 1983 to foster the necessary measures to assist motorcyclists and their families. At present A.I.M. serves over 220,000 motorcyclists and their families throughout BC, with 6 Chapters and total membership of 1,000. A person does not have to be a motorcyclist to be a member, just have the desire to assist injured motorcyclists and their families and pay a minimal yearly membership.

The Vancouver Chapter of A.I.M. is also a Registered Canadian Charity. Donations are utilized, in accordance with federal regulations and laws, to assist motorcycle accident victims and their families. Official receipts for Income Tax purposes for Charitable Donations to A.I.M. are issued by the Vancouver Chapter, which also administers these funds to achieve the objectives of A.I.M. throughout British Columbia.



AIM - A Personal Perspective Submitted by Dave Ward

While lying in my hospital bed a day or two after Giselle and I had our horrific motorcycle accident on the Sea to Sky Highway, a couple of weathered looking gentlemen came to visit. I had no idea who they were, but they came armed with several motorcycle magazines and pamphlets describing the organization they belonged to.

Dave and Gary introduced themselves and explained who they were and how they came to know we were in the hospital. It turns out one of our chapter members, Dan Fortin, is a member of their organization and suggested they pay a visit. Thanks Dan!! We chatted for a while and they left us with a load of information and booklets that were designed to help us through our upcoming ordeal with

doctors, lawyers and ICBC. They told us if there was anything they could do to help us out, no matter what, they would try to accommodate. Just give them a call.

Several weeks went by and I was sitting at home, arm in a sling, leg in a cast, hobbling around on crutches. I needed to get up to Squamish to deliver to the RCMP my statement of what I thought happened in the accident. I had no way of getting there. I remembered Gary leaving me his card and decided to give him a call. He came by the next morning and we drove up to Squamish together in his car. On the way back from Squamish we tried to identify the corner on the highway where the accident occurred and to have a look, and he then drove me to the ICBC holding yard to look at what was left of my bike.

Gary did all this without asking for a dime. I insisted on buying lunch. We talked about a lot of things during the drive and he explained how AIM works and some of the many things he has done to help downed riders. These guys keep busy!

I called Gary on another occasion to help me do some banking and again, he came over promptly to assist me getting around. These guys are awesome. They will not turn down any opportunity to help another fellow rider when he or she is down and out. There is no criteria. If they can help, they will, no matter how small or large the issue may seem. I was happy that our chapter decided to help them out a bit with our donation. I know it will be put to good use helping other riders.

Tires age. As tires get older, they get more stiff and less resilient, more susceptible to cracking, and overall more brittle. Even if tires are not worn out, they should be replaced after six or seven years. "But I never have tires last six or seven years!" you may say. That may be - but what if the tires were three years old when you bought them "new"? Or when you bought that "new to you" motorcycle - how old were the tires on it? How can you tell?

It's a well-kept secret in the tire industry that a) tires are unsafe after six or seven years, and that b) tires that are sold new are not necessarily new - they may have sat on the shelf for years before being sold to you. They look new, they were sold "as new" - but they are not new. Fortunately, there is a very simple way to find out the actual age of the tire, starting from its manufacture. Stamped into the side of every tire is a date code, that indicates the actual date of manufacture. It looks something like this:

Your "New" Tires may look new but may have sat on the shelf for years before you bought them.



In this case, it's the number "4209". In some cases, this will be prefixed with "DOT", as in "DOT4209". The first two numbers in the code is the week of manufacture - 52 weeks in a year, remember. The last two are the year - in this case, the 09 represents 2009. This can be approximated to the following - this is for the year 2010, and it will change slightly from year to year, but for the most part, this is how to convert the week number to the month:

01 - 05: January

06 - 09: February

10 - 14: March

15 - 18: April

19 - 22: May

23 - 27: June

28 - 31: July

32 - 35: August

36 - 40: September

41 - 44: October

45 - 48: November

49 - 52: December

Some tires will have a longer string of digits, like "NA2M4206" - in this case, it's the last four digits we are interested in, so this example would be the 42nd week of 2006.

What if your tire only has three digits? Throw it away! Tires made before 2000 used only one digit for the year. So a tire with the code "015" was made in January of 1995...or 1985!



Tech Tid Bits Submitted by Doug Wilkins, BC-D Technical Coordinator

Well, the weatherman has been great for us and we are all continuing to ride. The unfortunate thing about continuing to ride is that with the lazy days of summer behind us, Fall is upon us. With Fall comes falling leaves and may-be some rain. What better time to do a more intensive t-clock on your motor-cycle for Fall riding or the beginning of storing the motorcycle for winter.

So here it is again for all of us to re-mind us.

T is for Tires. Lately there has been talk that some tires were really bad to the point of having to truck the motorcycle back home. So look for thread depth. Go buy a check gauge for use. Check for wear, bulges and imbedded objects. **Air:** Check when cold **Wheels and rims:** Check for cracks, bearings and seals.

C is for Controls Check the levers, cables hoses and throttle. Frays on the cables, cuts or cracks or bulges on the hoses, and that the throttle snaps shut.

L is for Lights Battery terminals are clean and screws tight. Lens, make sure they are not cracked and securely mounted. Reflectors same as lenses. Check any wiring to make sure they are tight and the rubber cups are on the headlights under the fairings. Make sure you have the headlights aimed right.

O is for Oil Check to make sure it is topped up. Check all other fluids and do an oil change. Make sure the brake fluid reservoirs' are full. Check the coolant. Check the drum oil on the rear hub. IF you have not changed these oils and lubricants for a couple of years maybe this is the time to do it.

C is for Chassis Not hard, take the sides off and check the welds on the frame. Check the steering-head bearings and swing arm.

K is for Kickstand Check to see if it is bent and the spring is cracked or broken and there is


proper tension. Otherwise you will be bungee cording it to stay up so the engine will not shut off.

Other than that I have been told we will have great weather for October at least.

Keep smiling cause that is all we do when we ride.




