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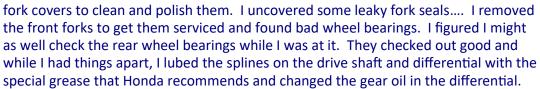

Message from the Chapter A Directors

Last month I wrote about some of the bike maintenance things that you should be doing before heading out on that first ride of the season. I took heed of my own advice and went over a few things on my bike just to be sure.

Well, here I am a week and a half into it. My bike is in parts, spread out all over the shop floor and every time I take something apart, I find another issue that needs tending to. What started as just a deep clean and polish and change the spark plugs has turned into a major overhaul of some important parts of the bike.





The leaky seals led to oil all over the brake pads, so they have been replaced as well. Replacing the pads led me to bleeding the brakes, so what the heck, flush the entire system and put in new DOT4 brake fluid. Might as well do the clutch fluid while I am at it......

While I had the wheels off the bike, I decided to try out the Mother's Aluminum polish I purchased to clean the rims. I highly recommend the product! After two applica-

tions - spray on, wait 2-3 minutes, wash off – the rims almost look like new, no scrubbing.

I arranged with our in-house mechanic, Rob Gosselin, to bring the front forks over on Saturday so he can replace the seals, so my bike is down for another weekend. I hope it is not a sunny, riding type of weekend!

Stay safe out there everybody, and see you at Bike Maintenance Day on the 10th. I hope my bike is back together by then to be able to ride it over.....

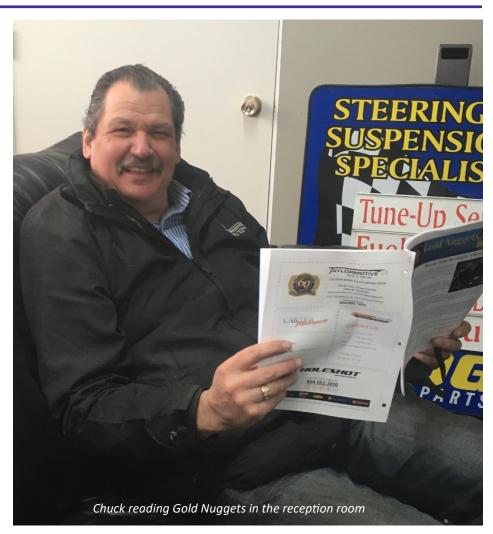
SPOTLIGHT ON MEMBERS

Taking a Leisurely Break with Chuck

harles Taylor, commonly known as Chuck, is a long time super-active riding member of the district. He leads many weekend and Tuesday night rides. He donates his time, facilitates. and his well-earned knowledge freely to Chapter "A" by sponsoring events and helping other members. It begs the question- if he is such a prominent member, why does he need more spotlight on him. The answer is that he doesn't. He is such a down to earth and easy-going guy; you would not know what he contributes behind the scenes.

The name Chuck and his company Taylormotive is synonymous. In the upstairs meeting room at Taylormotive, the Chapter would hold its annual silent auction organized by another well regarded member Kelly Parkes. In April each year, the Taylormotive Shop would host a "Maintenance Day" where GWRRA members would bring their bikes to do maintenance work with Chuck's professional tutorage. Without exceptions, this year's "Maintenance Day" will be on April 10th. However, due to Covid restrictions, attendance will be limited and



Covid mitigation protocol will be strictly followed.

My curiosity came when I learned that there was a rich history over five decades ago when Taylormotive was a Honda Motorcycle Dealer. It was at a time when Chuck's late father, Mr. Don Taylor, who passed in 2013, hand built the company and also when the founder of Honda, Mr. Soichiro Honda was still at the helm of Honda Motor Co.

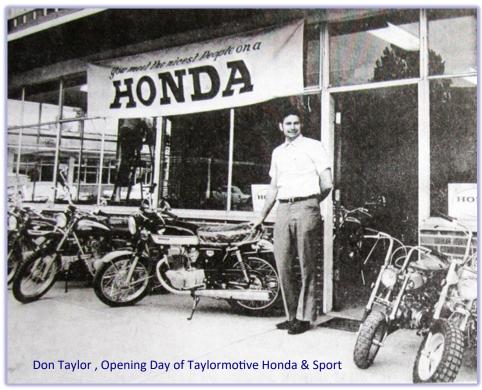
So, armed with a box of muffins, I visited Chuck at his iconic automotive service centre that stretches over half a block long in North Vancouver. Chuck was very generous with his time and information. We sank into the plushy leather sofa in the spacious reception room, and I posed Chuck my first question (more of a request).

Kenny- Tell me a bit about the early days of Taylormotive and Honda motorcycles.

Chuck— In 1959, my dad, Don Taylor, had an investor that was going to support him and wanted to get a young fellow going in business. Unfortunately, the fellow's wife took seriously ill, and he had to pull out all his backing. My dad had leased the building and three of his friends, Bob Crawford, Berry Newton, and Hans Krets had quit their good paying jobs to come and work for my father in his new business.

So, my dad went around to family members and came up with enough money to run the business and pay everyone for two weeks. And after that, it was like he said on "a wing and a prayer".





Kenny- That's an amazing beginning.

Chuck- The business took off from there. That was custom cars, transmissions, body work, general mechanical, hot rodding, custom car fabrication interior, upholstery, and body and paint. We did the whole car. They were done like custom the hot rods that you'd see in a YouTube video today. We were doing it back then in the 50s. As people got older, they started having families and children. The business turned into a domestic repair shop.

Chuck- That went on for about 10 years. And then my dad had an opportunity to go into a resort business, so he actually moved in 1968 up to Mara Lake, in the Okanagan, and ran a resort called Crystal Sands Resort. There were three partners, and it didn't work out, so we came back. My dad basically had managers set up in the automotive business, so he had no job to come back to.

Kenny- What did he do?

Chuck- So we ended up starting up a new business - Sales and Service for Arctic Cat snowmobiles, Scorpion snowmobiles, Honda motorcycles, and Sea Dart. We also built and sold tunnel hull boats as well. It was called Taylormotive Honda and Sports Division and our grand opening was on August 29th, 1970.

Kenny- I am impressed, so your father actually started 3 new businesses. Is that when he got the Honda Motorcycle dealership? Chuck- Yes, and from the day he opened his doors, it was BC's largest Honda dealer. Even though we opened at the end of August, the end of the season, our sales went right through the roof. The Honda product was really hot on the market at that time. Honda was just being introduced into Canada, so it was a great opportunity.

Kenny- Honda was only small CC bikes back then, right?

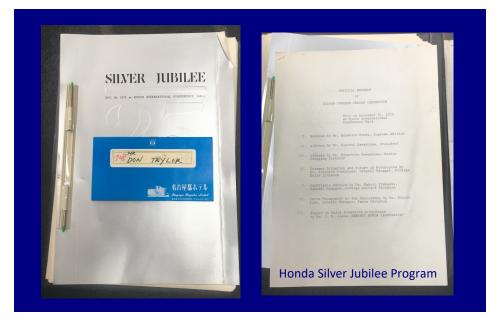
Chuck- Well, Honda just came out with a 750 in 1969 and when it hit the market, it created a lot of stir. That was the superbike of the day. And then in 1975 they came out with the Goldwing. That turned into the touring bike of North America. But at first, it came just a naked bike with no saddlebags, no trunk, no fairing, and no accessories on it.

Kenny- I didn't know that.

Chuck- Yeah, so because of the demands, in 1980 Honda came out with the full touring Goldwing with all the bags and fairing. They realized that it was a market that was worth going after.

Kenny- What contributed to Taylormotive's success of being the number one Honda dealer in BC?

Chuck- A lot of it was promotions and the promotional materials. My





dad also doubled the Honda war-ranty.

Kenny- Really?

Chuck- Yup, He doubled it. He knew being a Honda, you could rely on it.

Honda always tested their product well before they released it & when they did, it was always superior.

Kenny- Did your father ever visited the Honda factory in Japan?

Chuck- Yeah, that was the 25th anniversary Silver Jubilee in 1973. We were invited to the conference in Japan along with many top dealerships from Canada and around the world. He met Mr. Soichiro Honda there.

Kenny- How many people were selling Hondas around here?

Chuck- There were several dealers. There were Honda Centre, Allied Honda, Amor Honda, and Trev Deeley had the Honda as well. Clark



Simpkins was the distributor for the all the dealers

Kenny- You were going to school then, when did you get into the business?

Chuck- 1970, I was 11 years old at that time. I came to work at the shop, we had a rental motorcycle fleet, about a dozen bikes. The bikes that I serviced were Z-50 Honda, CT-70, ATC-9 trike, and a QA-50 which is even smaller than the Z-50. My job was to maintain them, change the oil, adjust the valves, set the timing, and etc. That was during the week each day after school. When I was caught up on all that, then I would assemble motorcycles as well. Take them out of the crate and put them Kenny- So that's what "dealer's motocross bike. It sure really took off together, put oil in them and check headlight, get everything working right and make sure all the signals and horn are working.

> Chuck- I used to race up and down the lane. And in 1973, Honda came out with the Elsinore, which was a

racing team. So, I used to do the demo in the back lane. I would go up the back Lane in all six gears on the back wheel!

Kenny- Wow!

Chuck- We had a racing team and motocross road racing at Westwood. We had some of the top riders set track records up in Westwood. One of the racers, George, he rode his 750 Honda so hard, he wore the casing down where it was leaking oil. He was leaning over so far. We also had a flat track racer, Dave Wilson, and he raced the Elsinore 250 and the XL 350 which were modified for the flat track. Yeah, back in that day so we had a full sponsorship race team.

Kenny- So why did Taylor Motive stop selling Honda?

Chuck- That was back in '77. It was because the insurance changes. New Government was in power. ICBC introduced new insurance rates, they actually doubled it. The insurance costed as much as a motorcycle.



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Basically, they put the motorcycle industry almost out of business. My father decided to close up the division. A lot of dealerships went out of business back then as well. He eventually migrated back into the business here and started looking after things again when one of the managers retired.

Kenny- When did you learn the trade?

Chuck- About 1977. I graduated early out of high school and started my apprenticeship in the automotive mechanic trade, they gave me 2 years credit because of my background and experience. I am also trained as a motorcycle mechanic.

At this time, I looked out the window and saw clouds were gathering, I wanted to ride home before it rains, since I had just washed and waxed my bike the day before. Chuck was sympathetic and he took me for a tour of the facility. The shop was spotless and well organized. It is equipped with the latest machineries and computers to handle what the modern automobiles require, from Tesla to BMW and Porsche to the traditional American Brands.



There were at least two American muscle cars from the 50s getting customized and rebuilt. I could not believe that I actually found all these many aspects of car repairs and customization under one roof. What was striking to me was that after 60 years, Taylormotive continues to do what they do best- customizing the whole car!

To Chuck, I asked my final question-If there was this one thing about the current Goldwing that you think Honda should improve on, what would it be? Chuck- Well, they have come out with the 2021 model and they increased the size of rear trunk. Some say that they can't put two helmets in the 2018. I think it's just people not understanding how. I haven't had any issues. I've toured all over with my 2018 Goldwing, got 65,000 kilometres on it now. There's been no issues with that bike whatsoever, just the regular maintenance items.

One thing I did find out is with the new Goldwing, you can turn the key fob "on" and "off". If you leave it "on" and leave it close to the bike, the bike thinks you're approaching, so it would turn the puddle lights on. I left the fob "on" in my jacket upstairs just above where the bike was parked in the garage. The puddle lights came on at night without me knowing and wore my battery down. So now I remember to push the button to turn the fob "off".

With that, I suited up. Chuck walked me to my 2008 GL1800 and showed me a "3/4 inch plywood under the centre stand trick" to work around the downside of the Ride-Off Centre Stand. I learned a lot about leadership today. *Kenny Locke*

The Dream-Tom and Donovan's 2008

When we last left Tom and Donovan on their adventurous trip across Canada and the U. S., they had just finished their journey across Canada. They had visited with Tom's sisters and some friends and were leaving Prince Edward Island for Maine. Tom-who had ridden his Honda 90CC around Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada as a teenager- had dreamt of riding a motorcycle across both countries one day. In the summer of 2008, he and his friend Donovan (who had just retired from education field) did just that!



Across The USA

e then headed to Maine to begin our ride across the USA. In Calais, Maine, the border people were excellent and wished us luck on our adventure across their country. As we were gassing up in Bangor, Maine, a young lady on a Honda came up and started talking to us. The next thing we knew, we were attending the areas' Goldwing meeting and sharing stories and laughter. We appreciated everyone's kindness in inviting us to share their evening with them.

Over the next several days, we caught the rain and windstorms of the leftover hurricanes. They included hail the size of quarters and wind blowing so strong that rain was blowing up onto the inside of my wind-

shield! There was even some road construction where the highway was reduced to mud and water holes where we could no longer see any pavement. It was all very rough and challenging, and Donovan and I did well just to stay upright.

Besides these (and some other) difficult challenges, however, the Eastern areas provided great beauty. There were times that we, along with all the other traffic, had to seek cover and watch as nature put on a show. But we carried on as bikers do; we just adapted to the circumstances we were in and moved forward.

And that "forward" was toward lowa, where we met with my sister and brother-in-law from Des Moines. They took us to their State Fair, the biggest in North America, and once again we were "spoiled". Around the area we discovered Corn Dogs and Pigs on a Stick and also the best corn on the cob that I had ever had. I am happy that my wife is from Iowa, she and her family have opened new windows to me on life in the American Midwest.

Nebraska allowed us the opportunity to find the graves of some of Donovan's ancestors, before others had moved to Canada. We got to visit some very old cemeteries and discovered some of his relatives. Donovan took several pictures for his family in Canada.

As we headed farther west, the weather became warmer and drier, then hotter. We experienced miles and miles of changing countryside and accents. We enjoyed the secondary roads and byways. Camping, riding, and talking our way across USA, we met many fascinating people who shared part of the adventure with us two Canadians. We felt this truly was a ride of a lifetime.

In South Dakota, we explored Wall, Black Hills, and Sturgis, where temperature was over 100 degrees F. We camped in Sturgis and met more interesting people. The Crazy Horse monument was a treat for the eyes. Deadwood, I got to know very well; I only got us lost twice in that town!

Driving onward to Sundance, Wyoming, we spent the



early evening looking at one of the most beautiful sunsets that I have ever seen. From Montana, I have fond memories of Great Falls (and the last Wing Ding in Billings), Custer's Last Stand, and good food.

In Idaho, I had my 1982 Gold Wing serviced in a very helpful, courteous and speedy manner at Coeur D'Alene Honda. They thought it was quite the trip I had made with my friend. (Continued on page 15)
