



Indigenous peoples have inhabited British Columbia, as described in their oral traditions. There are claims by the English to have explored the region in the 16th century, but it was the Majorcan-born Spanish navigator Juan José Pérez Hernández who did the first documented travel 1774. In 1778 English explorer James Cook reached Nootka Sound and set foot on British Columbian soil. There were several gold finds in British Columbia in the 1850s. The British colonial office responded to this situation by establishing B.C.'s mainland as a crown colony in 1858, naming it the Colony of British Columbia. In 1871 British Columbia became the sixth province of the Dominion of Canada.

The British Columbia Day Act was first introduced to the Legislative Assembly in 1974, and it gained royal assent in the same year. The aim of the Bill was to create a statutory holiday on the first Monday in August to recognize the pioneers in the province.—Source material from timeanddate.com

No flower can lift someone's spirits quite like **sunflowers**. They are bright and cheery, and as warm and inviting as the sweet summer sun. With brilliant yellow petals, also known as "rays," sunflowers have an unmistakable sun-like appearance that has made them a crowd favorite, especially in the summer months.

Sunflowers come in a number of varieties—ranging from small to very large, from having yellow petals to red. However, there is more to sunflowers than meets the eye. While they are stunningly beautiful, they also are rich in history and meaning.

Sunflowers symbolize adoration, loyalty and longevity. Much of the meaning of sunflowers stems from its namesake, the sun itself. These flowers are unique in that they have the ability to provide energy in the form of nourishment and vibrancy—attributes which mirror the sun and the energy provided by its heat and light. Sunflowers are known for being "happy" flowers, making them the perfect gift to bring joy to someone's (or your) day.

Artists throughout history loved the sunflower's unique splendor—those of the Impressionist era were especially fixated on the flower. The use of sunflower images as religious symbols has also been documented in some native societies. Wild sunflowers are often photographed with their tall stalks and bright petals stretched towards the sun. This interesting behavior, known as phototropism, inspired a motif that has appeared in many ancient works.

These beauties are still sourced for their seeds, as well as oils used for cooking and skin emollients. For a flower that



### THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN RAMBLE

### The Iron Butt Association (IBA) Saddle Sore 1000-mile Ride

n Sunday July 11th, 2021, Dave Ward, our Chapter Director and I finished what was my 1st Iron Butt Ride, the Saddle Sore 1000. In metric that is 1600km for certification.

Actual milage for me was 1758 kms according to the Garmin 62s I took along for GPS data redundancy. My finish time back at Surrey, BC was just under the wire at 22 hours and 20 minutes.

Dave's milage and time will be slightly different from mine since we started out from different locations and met up in Langley BC to ride together. Our ride took us via Hope, Princeton, Keremeos, Grand Forks, Creston, Invermere (Fairmont Hot Springs), Golden, Sicamous, Merritt, all points in between then home. I submitted the name of the ride to the IBA as the "Rocky Mountain Ramble".

There are a variety of IBA rides that come in different lengths and times. All of them long on distance and short on time. The Saddle Sore 1000 is the shortest one in distance and the rider has 24 hours to complete it. Consider it the entry level ride for the curious. In fact, the IBA encourages, or strongly

recommends you begin there to determine what your capabilities are before taking on the longer endurance rides. The Iron Butt Association's motto is "the world's toughest motorcycle riders". OK then, noted.

#### The Ride and Rider

I grew up surrounded by older brothers with motorcycles and I've been a rider and enthusiast of motorcycles all my life. If I sent a 23 and me swab away for analysis, I'm certain it would come back reporting a small percent of

motorcycle craziness was in my DNA.

My riding experiences over my younger years have included multiple longer trips on many types of roads, but distance and time were an afterthought. And planning? Please, most of the rides back then were usually "planned" during a recreational BS session with friends without thinking through the details. Bungee a small duffel bag onto your seat and away you go. This was going to be a little different as it was a planned and executed ride under rules.

After Dave and I met up in Langley we quickly motored onto Highway 1 east in the cool early morning. The cool air was a nice relief from the record setting high temperatures of the previous week. There is something very surreal about the being on the highway as dawn approaches and the Gold Wing's flat six engine purrs faithfully un-

der you. I felt good about the coming day.

Our 2nd fuel stop, counting our official start receipts, was Hope, BC. From there we started the Hope Princeton stretch of Highway 3 east. Not long after leaving Hope, Dave leading with a blinding array of lighting mounted on his bike, a deer came literally out of nowhere and dashed across the road from left to right. Dave's riding skills along with some lucky timing prevented a serious disaster. The whole event was captured on a mounted camera.



This incident illustrates the reason why I planned the ride counter clockwise. I had originally planned the ride clockwise from Hope but that meant coming through highway 3 at dusk (home stretch) with the ride behind us. Better to take on the known wildlife areas while we're still fresh with some daylight. So, I planned the route counter clockwise so Hope Princeton would be approached at the outset.

Princeton was our 3rd stop for rest, water and a light snack. No fuel. For the remaining ride every 150 -200 kilometers or so was punctuated with a stop for water, fuel, stretch and a light snack. The exception was a longer stop in Creston for lunch.

The traffic was relatively light in our direction of travel throughout the day except for just north of Cranbrook where road construction caused a 30-minute +/- delay for us.

Mid day temperatures did rise to 34-38 in some places but we were able to mitigate that with soaking scarfs in water before tying them on. I was wearing micromesh pants and jacket made by a prominent manufacturer of motorcycle gear, which worked as claimed. Overall I was comfortable the entire time in the heat with just a layer of dri-fit clothing underneath. I only added a layer for warmth coming back over the Coquihalla on the last stretch home.



At the 1000-kilometer mark I felt a little celebratory until I started thinking about the remaining 600 kilometers to go. But I remained strong and felt good about reaching our goal. The kilometers continued to whir by. It wasn't until reaching Merritt on our last leg that I began to feel the ride's effect on my body. The end was in sight and I had the will to continue but the body was beginning to wane a little. This was also the point where my Bluetooth headset started to fail and combined with the wind noise inside my helmet bike to bike communication be-

tween Dave and I was not happening. Luckily we were getting closer to home. Bike to bike communication is so important and sorely missed when you don't have it.

Finally, the finish line! My last gas receipt at 00:40hrs and 1758 kilometers! This ride left my mind and body feeling rather humbled but with a modicum of pride for the effort put in. Would I do it again? Now in retrospect with the aches subsided yes, I think I would. Goals are important in life, so I look forward to the planning, researching, and execution of another Iron Butt Ride at some point. In the meantime, I'll continue to enjoy the comradery of the meets and the rides put on by our GWRRA -chapter A members every weekend that I'm available.

I certainly want to thank our chapter director Dave Ward for spending the day with me on this ride. His experience was valuable, and his company was appreciated. Apparently Dave also knows how to draw animals out onto the road at precisely the right time for pictures. Who knew?

#### The Planning

IBA rides at their root are an exercise in planning. From what I've read the association does not encourage speeding or stimulants for riders to make their goals. Just the opposite in fact. They encourage safety, and they expect riders to know their limits and act accordingly.

My advice and \$4.50 won't buy a McDonalds latte but I would recommend if you decided to plan an IBA Saddle Sore 1000 for yourself plan a route to exceed the required distance. If the IBA milage tally differs from yours, their calculations are definitive, and you don't want to be disqualified over a few kilometers error in your planning. Download their application kit beforehand which includes all the documents you'll need for the ride including official start and finish instructions, and witness information as well as a log template.

#### The Fails

- HJC Full face helmet Mine pulled at my forehead continually and wind noise was distracting at times. A better fitting helmet will be my next consideration when I purchase one.
- The Sena 20s Bluetooth headset Battery lasted 14 hours or so. I brought a fully charged spare but didn't check connection quality of the spare and the volume was too low to be of any use. Combined with a noisy helmet comms were not happening on the last leg.
- 2018+ Honda Goldwing OEM forward lighting It seems to be insufficient at night under certain riding conditions.

Note: The ride has been submitted for certification but no confirmation so far, so the ride is still not official.





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
