## Message from the Chapter A Directors

By now I hope everybody has heard that the District has decided to postpone the Wings in the Cariboo Rally again. If you prepaid for your registration, you have the choice to move it forward or ask for a refund. It will be held on the same weekend in 2022 – July 21st - 24th.

In other news, riding season is closing in and it is time to think about getting your bike ready to ride again. Here are a few things you should look at before that first ride:

- Tires and air pressure
- Brake pads
- Check all your fluids and flush/bleed as necessary
  - ♦ Engine oil, Brake fluid, Clutch fluid
  - ♦ Coolant
  - Rear differential
  - ♦ Battery acid level
- Check your battery and actually have it tested
- Cables lube and adjust
  - ♦ Throttle cables
  - ♦ Choke cable (older bikes)
  - ♦ Reverse cables (1500's)
- Lights
  - ♦ Headlight hi/low beam
  - ♦ Tail lights
  - ♦ Turn signals
  - ♦ Stop lights
  - ♦ Any marker lights
- Safety switches
  - Brake light switches
  - Kickstand switch
  - ♦ Neutral safety switch
  - ♦ Clutch lever switches
  - ♦ Reverse switch (1500's) Continued on page 2

### From the desk of the District Director

### **Fellow wingers:**

Once again, your "District Team" is faced with making tough decisions as 2021 looks to be another year fraught with issues beyond our control. The result is that we will be cancelling the "Wings in the Cariboo 2.0" rally and pushing it forward into 2022.



**2021 District Rally (22-25 Jul) is to be replaced by a ride.** The ride will be based on the same dates and locations. Essentially, we are just removing the social events that might have contravened any COVID restrictions in place at that time.

Excellent rides are in the planning stages as you read this.

We are taking this action due to the uncertainty of the immediate future. With covid-19 variants now presenting, government restrictions remaining in place, as well as the venues we require not being available because of closures due to the pandemic, we are left with no ability to plan accordingly.

With the Pandemic clusters occurring in the region we will be visiting, local governments in the area are reluctant to work with us, even if they want to, as they must comply with regulations.

Tie all of that to the fact we may not all be vaccinated by the time the rally dates were planned and the Government Vaccination program does not appear to be as "robust" as originally thought, the prudent thing to do is to move the "Formal Version" of the rally forward to 2022. "It is the only way to give you our members good value for your "Rally Dollars" rather than put on a half-baked event".

New "Formal" rally dates for "Wings in the Cariboo – Revisited" are July 21<sup>st</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> 2022. We will be moving all reservations, venue rentals and catering to those dates. All of these vendors have agreed to do this. Anyone that has registered or moved their registration forward from 2020 is welcome to do the same for the 2022 rally. We will be sending notices to all registrants and they can indicate their desires to do this again or get refunded.

Notices will be going out advertising the replacement ride as well as a schedule and routes. More details will be available in the next few weeks and you can begin planning your summer rides.



In a casual conversation with David Ward, Chapter A director, I mentioned that I spent almost 10 years in my younger days in Prince George. He said there are a couple of senior members in chapter A who were from Prince George, and as a matter of fact, they were the Directors of GWR-RA Prince George Chapter. I was intrigued by that.

I told David that I would be interested in talking to them about Prince George - perhaps they know some of the same people I used to know - and about motorcycling in general. This led to me having an engaging morning coffee and butter tarts with the Goetzes.

Perhaps we are all mind readers because when I called the Goetzes, they immediately said my ears must have been burning as they were just talking about me. We quickly discovered that we had some mutual friends from five decades ago. A couple of names popped up that I have not heard in years. The anticipation to our meeting just tripled.

Tom was waiting for me at the glass front door of his high-rise building in the Westend of Vancouver. I chose to take public transit to the City since it is the most efficient mode of transportation. Of course, if my Wing were insured, I would have taken that instead. Their warmth and openness were immediately felt as I sat down with Tom and Marian. They had photos, magazines, and a 1/12 model of a red Gold Wing ready to show me.

Our conversation straight away focused on our old friends Joe and Rick, both of whom I worked closely with for many years. Also, they were Tom's riding and outdoor sport buddies and family friends. We could have talked about just those two for the whole day. However, my curiosity about the cross-countries trip chronicled in the Wing World Magazine, September, and Octo-



ber 2009 editions got the better of me and our conversation shifted to the pictures and the article.

This article highlighted Tom and his friend Donovan's epic trip from Prince George, BC to the Maritimes and then from Eastern USA back across the states to the Rockies and home. It is a real page turner. With permission from its author, Tom Goetz, I am reposting it here, in its entirety, to preserve its feel of wonderment and sense of adventure. Since we are still under travel restrictions, this will really make you want the restriction to be over now.



Meanwhile I learnt that Tom and Marian were avid Gold Wing riders, and they have since sold their beloved Gold Wing, retiring from riding, but not motorcycling in general. At one time, they had two Gold Wings in their stable, both kept in immaculate shape. They had ridden across Canada and the USA serval times and attended multiple Wing Ding events. As recently as 2016, they participated in a GW rally in Red Deer Alberta. When they were the

# The Dream-Tom and Donovan's 2008

# Adventure, Part 1 By Tom Goetz, GWRRA, Prince George, BC

When I was a teenager riding my Honda 90CC across Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, I had a dream that one day I would ride a motorcycle call across both Canada and the United States. Last summer, my friend, Donovan Unruh, and I fulfilled that dream.



fter retiring from the education field, we both longed for a new adventure. The more we discussed this trip the more we felt we were about to become explorers- Donovan on his 1992 Yamaha 1100 CC Virago and me on my 26-year-old Honda Goldwing 1100 CC Aspencade. And so, it came to be that at the end of June in 2008, we set off on our great adventure.

### **Across Canada**

Our first day out was bright and sunny, and we had a joyous trip to Edmonton, Alberta as we absorbed the scenery all around us. At Mount Robson, we met a group of bikers from Newfoundland. These grown men were like little kids, they were so excited at the beauty of the site. They spoke to me in their native tongue....." tis that quite the sight". (I translated for Donovan!)

From Edmonton, we carried on eastward into Saskatchewan. (Until then, I hadn't realized you could saddle up a mosquito and go for a ride!) As we set up camp, I discovered I had invited all the mosquitoes in the area to come in for a visit. Many stayed for dinner — on me!

In Manitoba, we stopped at the military museum in Shiloh. Donovan had a friend who had donated some equipment for display. Many of the soldiers were in Afghanistan on tour, and we heard many firsthand experiences of our troops.

Later, in Brandon, I had my first service for my bike. The Honda shop people there were great and took me right in. They did a great job and charged very little for their time.


In Ontario, what I asked myself most often was - Is this province ever going to end? We hit a lot of road construction. Ontario is apparently trying to rebuild almost all of its highways. We could do nothing but try to improve our riding skills on these roads because of the variety and the state of what we were riding on, in, and through, (In fact, I am sure we are still on a first name basis with many of the flag people throughout the province!) In southern Ontario, we got to stay with some of Donovan's family. There are many great rides in this part of the province, and we were able to explore them for days. We also got to eat home cooked meals and do our laundry without having to search for quarters!

Next, we were on to Ottawa, our nation's capital. Like us, I am sure many people have a sense of pride and joy in seeing their capital city. We walked everywhere and enjoyed the whole multicultural environment in which we found ourselves. Everywhere we went, we explored the history and culture of the local people. We began to feel like sponges soaking up all this amazing information and sharing stories, adventures, and food.

In Québec, we saw many celebrations -the city was celebrating its 400th anniversary. As we went farther east, many things got even older (not just me!) It was humbling to realize just how much history this country has seen.

In New Brunswick, we started our travels in the Maritimes at an 18th century village call Kings Landing. There, we saw how many of the new immigrants to this land had survived and prospered in the New World. (Though I don't understand how they could have survived - I couldn't find a Tim Horton's coffee shop anywhere!) We also got to see the Tides at the Bay of Fundy at



a place called Hopewell Rocks. The water there rises over 40 feet twice a day.

In Nova Scotia, I rented a cottage for a week in Baddeck, Cape Breton. It is right on the Bra d'Or Lake. (By the way, there are 28 Tim Horton's in Cape Breton, not that I was counting or anything!) We used this cottage as a base and explored all over the area. One town we

went to was founded in 1604; places that old are always exciting to visit. We also went to Sidney Mines to explore the underground coal mines. There, we walked far out into the ocean- all the while underground.

In addition, we found that one of the finest restorations in the world goes on at Fort Louisburg. We walked about this fort as if we were two of its guests in the 18th century during the French occupancy. And as luck would have it, we met up with a friend of mine who was holidaying with his family. To our surprise, he brought us four lobsters for dinner- nice friends! I couldn't wait to get my "claws" into those lobsters. To say they were good is an understatement.

Soon it was time to catch the ferry to Newfoundland. At the docks, we joined 21 other bikers in the lineup. One of the riders was from Newfoundland, and he and his wife invited us to visit their home and share some food with them. He is one of 23 children, and his wife is

one of 12. Needless to say, their family gatherings are beyond my imagination. Newfoundlander's are a very friendly people- warm, caring, and always making sure you have enough food.

Like the people, the countryside of Newfoundland is unique and striking. Around every bend, the terrain changes from mountain views to ocean views. Plus, all the times we ate in restaurants, it tasted just like homemade food. Donovan had his first Jig's dinner along with blueberry grunt (a dinner in Newfoundland that often consists of either salt beef or salt riblets, cabbage, potatoes, carrots, turnips and more. And a dessert delicacy consisting of blueberry sauce and dumplings). I want you to know that I did not gain any weight on this trip; however, I can't speak for Donovan.

After Newfoundland, we came back through Nova Scotia to see Halifax. There, we found wonderful campgrounds just 6 kilometers from Peggy's Cove. The campground's beauty and location

were unique; we had a whole area for ourselves right on the ocean. The stars at night were truly a sight, and it seemed that around almost every corner there was something to see or of which to take a photo. (I encourage anyone who has not yet visited the Atlantic Region of Canada to do so. You will not be disappointed!)

In Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, the Maritime Museum was a treat. We got a bonus, however- the Bluenose Schooner was in the port. The campground there was also wonderful. It was surrounded by very old homes and buildings, all beautifully painted.

Soon afterward- one rainy day as I approach a small bridge- I saw at the last second a big hole full of water. I swerved, but my back tire hit it full force at a bit of an angle. I thought I had popped my tire and bent the rim; right away I could feel the tire rubbing. Thanks to my Gold Book, I saw there was a Honda dealer close by in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia. I managed to ride to the

shop, where I met Ian Corbett (Parts Manager) and Fred Morgan (Technician). When they heard that I had hit a big hole, they took my bike in right away and very gently look over my 26-year-old bike from front to back. They did my repairs quickly and thoroughly, and I cannot say enough about the Gold Book and its biking community that can look after you in your time of need. They represent what Goldwinging is all about, and my thanks go out to them!

From Nova Scotia, we traveled on to Prince Edward Island (PEI) to visit my sisters and some friends. Being treated to a lobster dinner in New Glasgow was very fulfilling. Touring around such a scenic place, one feels enriched by all the natural beauty. We got to ride the new Confederation Bridge. It is 13 kilometer (about 8 miles) long and joins PEI and New Brunswick.

# ICBC Rate Cut, Refund, & On-Line Rate

By now, every motorist in BC is probably aware of 15 to 20% discount starting on May 1st, 2021. Much of this reduction will come from changing to no-fault insurance, now called Enhanced Care. Besides the discount, there is also the news of a refund to policy holders due to the much lighter usage because of the Covid19 travel restrictions. The ICBC website also bolstered an improved rate calculator to let motorists to work out their savings and the cost of insurance. Here are three downloaded short news articles expanding on these topics. For more information, check out the ICBC web site - ICBC.com.

Rob Shaw, Vancouver Sun, Publishing date: Feb 06, 2020

- 1. B.C. is moving to a full "no-fault" insurance model, which means in most cases you won't be engaged in a lawsuit after a crash to win damages. Instead, the Insurance Corp. of B.C. will pay money to you directly.
- 2. Premiums will drop an average of 20 per cent, or \$400 annually, starting in 2021, according to ICBC. And ICBC has applied for no change in rates this year, leading up to the drop.
- 3. The change starts May 1, 2021. In the meantime, the \$5,500 cap on pain and suffering claims for minor injuries remains in place, and payments for major accidents will still be hashed out in court.
- 4. The changes will save approximately \$1.5 billion annually, much of which ICBC says will be used to boost the type and length of benefits you receive, such as visits to chiropractors, massage therapy and counselling. New benefits will include compensation for travel, personal care assistants and school fees, among others. For example, payments for lost wages due to a crash will increase to \$1,200 a week, from \$740. Your doctor, not ICBC, decides what benefits you will receive and for how long.
- 5. Fault will still be determined in a crash, but only for the purpose of punishing bad drivers through increases to their premiums. No matter who is at fault, everyone will receive the same medical benefits.

VANCOUVER -- Drivers in B.C. will be receiving rebate cheques from ICBC later this year.

Premier John Horgan announced Tuesday that the Crown corporation saved millions of dollars last year during the COVID-19 pandemic due to a lower number of claims, and \$600 million in savings will be passed on to British Columbians.

"This will be in the form of a one-time rebate cheque averaging about \$190 per policy holder, the largest single give back to policy holders in Canada through COVID-19," the

premier said, adding the insurer is in a "favourable" financial position.

Drivers who held policies with ICBC between Apr. 1 and Sept. 30 of last year will be eligible and cheques will be sent out starting in March.

Public Safety Minister Mike Farnworth said the amount people receive will depend on the level of coverage.

"If you had full policy coverage during that time then obviously you would get full coverage in the rebate, which I think works out to about 19 per cent. And then if you were partially insured during that time then it would be a partial rebate coverage," Farnworth said.

When asked why it's taken a number of months for the rebate to be announced, Horgan said his government needed to be cautious given ICBC's previous "volatility in their financial position."

"We wanted to be absolutely clear we weren't doing damage to the corporation that had just turned itself around to meet what we believe is a legitimate return to policy holders," Horgan said.

ICBC president and CEO Nicolas Jimenez said the rebates will be calculated automatically.

"We know precisely what people paid for how long their policies were active between April and September and it is very accurate for us to be able to calculate the reduction they're owed as a result of this COVID benefit," Jimenez said.

The BC Liberals say the rebate is too low.

"Motorists have paid into insurance and seen a 50 per cent reduction in accidents, so would that equate to a 50 per cent reduction in premiums?" said Mark Morris, the official opposition critic for Public Safety and Solicitor General.

He also questioned why the government has not released any financial records related to ICBC. "I don't know how the math works, but I'd like to find out," he said.


The Insurance Corporation of British Columbia's improved online estimator tool provides customers with an estimate of how much they will save upon renewing their auto insurance under the new Enhanced Care coverage, effective May 1.

ICBC's Enhanced Care seeks to provide customers savings on their premiums, amounting to 20 per cent on average, on their full basic and optional coverage from ICBC. Most customers will likewise be eligible to receive a one-time, pro-rated refund. The new coverage seeks to offer more affordable vehicle insurance rates in B.C. and to provide customers with access to better care and recovery benefits if they are injured in an accident, no matter who was responsible.

The online insurance estimator tool will inform customers about how the upcoming premium savings may affect them, how much they can expect to pay for auto insurance in the future and how much they may receive in a refund from ICBC.

"Our government is set to deliver much more affordable ICBC premiums, and now drivers can see how much they're going to save and how much of a refund they can expect after May 1," said Mike Farnworth, B.C.'s public safety minister and solicitor general.

"Our online estimator tool will help to make clear the extent of Enhanced Care savings British Columbians can expect as we move toward our May 1 launch, delivering not just lower-cost insurance but also significantly improved benefits, regardless of fault," said Nicolas Jimenez, president and chief executive officer of ICBC.





If a customer needs to renew before May 1, the online estimator tool will show the cost of their next renewal and the savings they can get on optional insurance pursuant to the current insurance model. If the customer's renewal is after May 1, the estimator tool will show their savings under Enhanced Care and the amount owed by ICBC in a refund.

Customers may also use the estimator tool to add or remove drivers listed on their policies, to modify coverage limits and deductibles and see how these changes will impact their premiums and to sign up for direct deposit. The tool also allows customers to sign up for email communications, which is a part of ICBC's efforts to enhance its digital services.

If the estimator tool's capacity of 1,000 customer renewal estimations at a time has been exceeded, the tool will show customers a general estimate of their overall refund, which is based on their existing policies, at least until the user volume has decreased.

The backgrounder notes that customers may also potentially avail of additional discounts not shown in the | tool, including a low-kilometre or advanced safety technology discount. Customers are urged to ask their | brokers about these discounts.





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
